A1 Lions Support Service Dogs

Pups and people walk for Purina Walk for Dog Guides Courtesy of The Essex Voice by Sylene Argent

Sadlers Park had paws prancing on the pavement last Sunday as local dogs and their families herded together as the Essex and District Lions Club hosted the nation-wide Purina Dog Walk for Dog Guides.

Jacqui Tofflemire-Flood, Secretary of the Essex and District Lions Club, said that there were 17 dog and owner teams walking the track at Sadlers Park to help raise funds for the Dog Guide program ran out of Oakville. The participants donated pledges that they had gathered prior to the event.

Each Guide Dog costs roughly \$23,000 by the time it is ready to find a permanent home with someone with a disability. Tofflemire-Flood said that Dog Guides trains dogs for the visually and hearing impaired, and for special needs persons.

The dog will spend its first

year with a foster family before heading back to Oakville for training. Once the training has been completed, the dog is housed temporarily with its perspective owner to ensure they are compatible before the dog is moved to its new owners location.

Mickey Puddicomb and her 6-year old black lab Leader Dog, Emerson, were at the walk. Puddicomb has been visually impaired since she was a youngster and said that when she got her first leader dog 37 years ago, I got pride, dignity, and the quality of my life back. Puddicomb attends the Leader Dog School in Rochester, Michigan.

Tofflemire-Flood said that if there are any community-minded individuals who would be interested in joining the Lions Club, they are welcome to attend a meeting to see what they are all about.

Nine-year old Kailynn Lemire and her five year old buddy Bonz came out to support the Purina Dog Walk for Guides at Sadlers Park that was hosted by the Essex and District Lions Club.

Hyde Park Lions Raise \$15,000 for LFC Dog Guides Every Thursday evening from May until September, weather permitting (12 out of 20 nights), Hyde Park and District Lions held

their Country Cruizin' car show at Fleetwood Farms. On average we had over 200 cars per night. Through the generous donations of our cruise drivers and quests, we presented to LFC Dog Guides a cheque on September 24th for \$15,000.

Hyde Park and District Lions looks forward to this event again next year and encourages all Lions in District A-1 and MD"A" to come out and enjoy a evening of fun and being able to view some great classic cars.

Glencoe Youth in Lions International Youth Exchange to Austria

International youth exchanges between Canada and countries throughout the world is one of the Lions organization's most successful endeavors. For the first time this year a Glencoe youth applied with the Glencoe District Lions Club to be a participant in such an exchange. That resulted in the Glencoe club sponsoring Jennara Field for an exchange to Austria. She returned recently and just in time to participate in the CNE's Ambassador of the Fairs competition in which she placed first runner up.

The program has individual clubs sending area young people to other countries and hosting students from overseas. The exchange generally lasts four weeks, including a one-week camp when all the students in a Lions Club district gather. This summer four youths stayed with Glencoe Lions and the club also hosted all of the exchange youths who camped at Mt. Brydges for a week after their stays with host families.

Members of the Glencoe club have in the past hosted several youths from many different countries in the world but this was the first time a youth from here has asked to be a participant. At the local club's first regular dinner meeting of the current Lions year held in the arena auditorium on Monday, Sept. 7, Jennara Field spoke on her experiences. It was also her opportunity to thank the club for covering all of her travel expenses to and from Austria. While there all her lodging, travel, entertainment and food expenses were covered by Lions clubs in Austria.

Jennara is the daughter of Tom and Julie Field, a graduate of Glencoe District High School and now in her second year at the University of Guelph studying biochemistry.

Between her two host families and a camp that followed Jennara toured many interesting places such as thousand year old cathedrals, Hapsburg palaces, castles, wine making facilities, cities such as Vienna and the Austrian parliament buildings, the birth places of famous people like Mozart and others. She also was on an eightday hike through the Austrian Alps and played lots of sports, including golf, sailing, white water rafting and soccer.

Jennara said she picked Austria as her destination because in all likely hood she would never get there otherwise.

The Lions International Youth Exchange program is organized to grant young people the opportunity to live with families in a foreign country and to gain an understanding about the customs, history and culture of people different from their own.

While friendships, memories and experiences are all gained, the ultimate goal is to have each participant, upon returning home, apply the greater awareness and appreciation of others to fellow students, friends and family; to foster harmony and understanding toward good will in international relations. This youth exchange can truly be called ~ 'Passport to World Peace and Understanding'.

It is not a vacation, it is a cultural exchange, however participants will see and do things the average tourist would never have an opportunity to experience.

Because of the internet most participants, just like Jennara, will be keeping in touch with many of their new found friends through the Lions International Youth Exchange program. There were 42 students from 26 nations at the Austrian exchange that beside Jennara also included Heather Bell, a Grade 11 student sponsored by the Lions Club of Thamesford. When the flight crew on the way to Austria discovered there were two exchange youths on board they were promptly ushered into first class accommodation.
