The Legal Division received information from a law firm in London, Ontario regarding litigation initiated by the former Lions Club, Westmount Lions Club. The law firm had obtained on behalf of the Westmount Lions Club (located in London, Ontario) a Judgment against a Mr. Maurice John Needham for funds that had been fraudulently taken from the club. The Club is no longer in existence and the law firm has continued to collect the funds from Mr. Needham. They need instructions as to where to send the money. Guided by Lions Clubs International principles, the money collected should return to a club to benefit the community where the Westmount Lions Club serviced. This is where I need your assistance. Could you identify the club or clubs (if we need to evenly split the funds) to transfer the funds. If there are no clubs that service this area, perhaps there is a local Lions foundation that services this area.

My objective for the year is working with clubs, District Officers and the MERL Team to bring new programs or help to promote those that are being put on this year. And the big one for the year is to find and train s replacement for myself.

Last year as convention chair it was decided that the clubs would take the banner stands to use at convention. Please stop and pick up your clubs stand.

**Retention – PDG Jacqui Flood:** Thank you for allowing me to serve District A-1 as the Retention part of the MERL Team. Last years statistics revealed that we brought in 48 new members, but we also dropped 79 members. So our biggest problem is retention. We need to reassess our strategies if we want to reverse this trend.

Each club has to identify their own retention problems. Areas that need to be scrutinized for problems are:

- Meetings
- Social Activities
- Community Service
- New Members
- Office holding
- Existing Lions

My goal this year is to decrease the percentage of dropped members from 1.5 to 1% by June, by giving a retention workshop at least once in each Region. Another goal is to promote an effective orientation program and to offer it to each region. The "Refreshing Your Club" workshops will offer a practical approach to any club to identify areas to improve their retention. Lions, please help me to reach my goals to reverse this trend to build a healthy district and reach our Governor's goals of 2 new clubs plus a net increase of 48 members. Let's all work together to surpass his goals.

Facing each and every club, is the challenge to keep members motivated, encouraged and proud to continue to expand our varying community betterments to the ever changing needs of our communities.

To accommodate this, a 'key role' in any service organization is appointing an active 'Public Relations Officer'. The role of a PRO is "To promote awareness of Lions Clubs and, the service of Lions Clubs among the general public".

To promote awareness....effective communication needs to be made.

We all have our definition of communication – The Webster's dictionary defines it as 'the means of imparting information or intelligence by word or writing'. So why are we not getting our word out there 'free of charge' via TV/Newspapers in major centres of Southwestern Ontario? A lot has to do with the fact that we have either failed to recognize the importance of having a PRO or we have never made or considered making contact with the various media sources that may be available to us and work with them, or both.

Local stations – news, radio and television/cable have a mandate to provide for 'Public Service Announcements' – some clubs have created websites to promote activities. By exercising your rights to these 'free' public services, you also promote the awareness each club stands to benefit from, when addressing the needs of both the club and community.

It has been said that 'knowledge is power' -- with the public being equipped with the knowledge of what you as Lions do in the community leading to increased membership. Find out from the media what will make news and steer your efforts in that direction. All news is not bad news.

DG Lion Don, I would ask that each club be made aware that I am available to coach and/or assist any Lion who may be appointed as PRO for their club.

# Youth Exchange - Lion Jim Deslippe

I would like to begin by saying that seeing that it was my first year being the YEC it was a lot of fun to do and although a lot of work, very rewarding.

Donations this year were down substantially from <u>\$8570</u> last year to <u>\$5850</u> this year which made things very challenging and added few changes to the way we did things this year.

Although the expenditures are not quite finished it looks like we spent approximately \$5600 this year on the camp and other expenditures associated with it.

This is down from previous years as we did certain things to reduce our cost from using vans instead of buses to buying our Canada's Wonderland tickets from Lion Marty's workplace where we got a nice discount. It was a very successful camp and as you will see from the slide show a good time was had by all.

### Slide show

15 Youth arrived in Toronto on July 5<sup>th</sup> from 11 different countries to start their 4 week stay in our District. I should add that all the districts of Ontario had the youth arrive on the same day this year so there was 128 youth that arrived in total that day to be hosted by Lions clubs of Ontario.

Here is your youth for 2008 and the counselors are, myself, Lion Marty Moore, Lioness Kim Schindell and Lion Trigger our camp security.

After spending 20 days with host families the youth arrived at camp on July 26th in Mount Brydges.

Following the opening day of camp where the youth learned how to set up their own tents and get acquainted with each other, supper was provided by the Mount Brydges Lions club.

We were then hosted on the Sunday afternoon by the Melbourne Lions club for a game of baseball and supper. Most European youth have no idea how to play ball so it can be very entertaining watching them learn the game.

On Monday we went to Niagara Falls where we were met by the Chippewa Lions club who provided us with tickets to go up the Skylon Tower. We also took the maid of the mist and spent the afternoon touring the area before going to the Chippewa Lions club house where supper was provided for us.

Tuesday was Grand Bend day where the Grand Bend Lioness provided us with lunch and then we spend a fun day on the beach. Supper that night was provide by the Glencoe Lions club who also provided a fun time for the youth, and the counselors I might add, with a karaoke night where we all got to sing and have a good laugh at each other.

Wednesday we went to Canada's Wonderland. The drive there was not very optimistic as it was pouring down rain all the way but once we arrived it was amazing how the rain stopped almost the minute we walked through the gates. As you can see from the pictures the youth really enjoyed the day there.

Thursday was somewhat of a different day this year as the Strathroy Lions Club picked us up at 8:30 am and provided us with a complete day of entertainment. We started out with attending the Texas Longhorn Ranch where we learned to rope, swam and had a water polo competition and were provided with lunch. We then went to Strathroy where the youth had a horseshoe tournament and then on to the Strathroy Lions clubs New club house where we had supper and had an excellent time learning to square dance.

At this point we want to say a special thank you to Lion Trigger who for 27 years now has dedicated one week of his holidays every year to coming to camp and looking after the camp while the youth are away. This year we did do something different and we brought Lion Trigger with us to Niagara Falls and the Delaware Lions club looked after the camp that day.

Friday was our International day at camp as well as the closing ceremonies which were attended by approximately 80 people including host families, Lions and Lioness members. Supper was provided by the Mount Brydges Lioness club.

Saturday was take down day for the camp and another wonderful 12 hours spend at Toronto airport sadly saying goodbye to the youth.

Other clubs that provided us with meals were the Belmont Lions, Lion Sylvia Watson from New Orleans Pizza in Mount Brydges and the Petrolia Lions. We also wanted to say a thank you to the Mount Brydges Lions for once again providing the facilities for the camp.

# **Healing Garden – PRC Eugene Graham**

The Healing Gardens project is heading into its final phase with the completion date set for December 31 2008.

Likewise, the construction of the Children's Hospital is beginning its final phase with a contract let to Ellis-Don Construction with completion expected in 2011.

The slide presentation will give the members present an overview of the hospital and the concept of the Healing Gardens.

The original commitment for the Lions of Districts A-1, A-2, A-9 and A15 was to raise \$250,000. District A-2 support has been very limited because many clubs feel they have similar facilities in Hamilton. To date \$213,600 has been raised toward this goal, leaving about \$36,500 to be raised by December 31.

District A-1 has raised \$83,400 with a final goal of \$90,000 to be attained by the end of the year. This amounts to \$6600. This makes A-1 's share somewhat more than the other two districts but it is believed that our District stands to benefit most, especially London-Middlesex area as all birthing (over 6000) annually will be at this hospital.

Governor Don has made the successful completion of this project one of his priorities for this year and it is my wish that after six years of chairing it that the clubs of A-1 will help us in achieving this goal. After all it is our children and our grandchildren right here in Ontario who will benefit.

#### Diabetes Awareness & Cavalcade – Lion Bev Wirta

I would like to thank Governor Don for asking me to continue on with this Chair

The great news is that the Ontario Government has made an announcement that they will provide insulin pumps to adults over the age of 18 who have Type 1 Diabetes.

In mid-September the program will begin and 1,300 adults who have met the screening criteria will be given an insulin pump along with a grant of \$2,400 each year for insulin supplies. This pump will be replaced every 5 years.

I will be sending out to each club the fact sheets published by the Ontario Government and an informative bulletin from the CDA about this announcement after getting the district directory.

I would like to remind the clubs that at the next Cabinet meeting in October we will be having our Cavalcade presentation of cheques. In the mail out I will be sending a copy of the new Harry A Newman application and your club can either make a donation to the CDA or they can apply for a Newman Award. November is Diabetes Awareness month and I would encourage each club to take up a special project. I would be pleased to attend any club who is having an open house for their community, a special diabetes event or would just like me to visit their club with diabetes information.

# No Child Without - Lion Bruce Edwards

I am here today representing a program new to Lionism. When I say that it is new to Lionism, early in 2008 then Vice-governor Don asked me to consider this committee posting for the 2008/2009 Lions year. I did have a display table at the Sarnia A-1 Convention in April 2008, and I have spoken at two Zone Meetings and a few individual Club Meetings before the close of the 2007/2008 Lions year. Officially, I am considering today the kick-off for NCW in District A-1.

Briefly, NCW is a program of the Canadian Medic Alert Foundation. I am sure that we have all seen one of the Medic Alert bracelets worn by someone who has a possible medical situation that could lead to an **anaphylactic** reaction. The CMAF has pledged to provide, free of charge, a medic alert bracelet or necklet to every child under the age of 14 within five years. International Director Lion Terry Graham heard of the initiative, and felt that it was something that Lions could become involved with. It is hoped that most of the Lions Clubs across Canada will adopt at least one elementary school within their area by the end of the five years. Of course, I can not take the time to explain the full program today, (I believe that Lion Carolyn has provided an information sheet in our packet), but I am hoping that I might be invited by Zone Chairs to their Zone Meetings to further describe the NCW Program. I would urge the District Officers and the Club Presidents to visit the web-site listed in the information sheet.

I might add that there are several advantages to Lions Clubs and Lions Members as a result of our association with the CMAF.

I was encouraged by the reception at the Clubs that I spoke to earlier this year and as a result of those meetings we have a commitment from the Sarnia Township Lions Club to sponsor a school near Sarnia and I believe that at least three other A-1 Clubs are considering doing the same in their area.
