Lioness Club History

Lioness Clubs began in America as a result of the success of the auxiliary clubs which were started for the wives of the all-male Lions Clubs. The Lioness emblem and name were approved in 1975 and membership was open to any lady over the age of 18, whether or not she was married to a Lion. The first Club to be formed was the Mount Pleasant Club, North Carolina on December 24, 1975.

The Colours Purple and Gold.

Purple stands for loyalty to country, to friends, to one's self and to integrity of mind and heart. It is the traditional colour of strength, courage, and tireless dedication to a cause.

Gold symbolizes sincerity of purpose.

Meaning of The Lions emblem placed on the \mathscr{L} is the letter "L" standing for Law, Liberty, Labour, Loyalty, Love, and Lions. The "L" is placed on a circle with two lion profiles looking two ways representing a Lion or Lioness looking in every direction for an opportunity to give unselfish service.

Viewpoint

Before photographing your subject, take time to think about where you will shoot it from. Our viewpoint has a massive impact on the composition of our photo, and as a result it can greatly affect the message that the shot conveys. 





PERSON OF INTEREST THE MIRACLE WORKER - ANNE SULLIVAN

Anne's Formative Years (1866-1886)

Anne was determined to get out of Tewskbury. She had heard of a school for blind children in Massachusetts and she had heard that an investigation of Tewksbury was about to take place. In 1880, when Frank B. Sanborn, an official for the State Board of Charities of Massachusetts, came to inspect the school, Anne flung herself at him saying, "Mr. Sanborn, Mr. Sanborn, I want to go to school!"

Her plea was successful. Very soon after she had pleaded with the official, she was sent to the Perkins School for the Blind. Some of the women who lived at Tewksbury dressed her for the journey, replacing her threadbare and ill-fitting garments with better clothing.

Anne found it hard to adapt to the Perkins School for the Blind. It was a quiet and polite place, unlike the rude environment of Tewksbury that she was used to. Tewksbury was noisy and raw. The working class men and women, who were predominantly Irish Catholic, expressed all their emotions out loud and in public. Perkins on the other hand was quiet and sedate, reflective of its prosperous and Protestant patronage. Distasteful matters were not discussed at Perkins, whereas Tewksbury painted the world in very real, stark colors.

Sullivan was mortified when the other girls laughed at her for not being able to spell the simplest words. This made her determined to succeed. In time, she became a good reader and a lover of poetry.

A year after her arrival at Perkins, she was sent to the Massachusetts Eye and Ear Infirmary, where she had the first of two operations. The second operation took place a year later in 1882. These operations changed Sullivan's life. Her sight was greatly improved after ten years of almost no usable sight.

At Perkins Anne's hard work and keen mind resulted in her being chosen as the valedictorian of her class in 1886.
